# Children's Chorus Gives Concert In Memorial Hall, Bringing Close To Girl Scout-Boy Scout Drive

Singing Children Gowned Strikingly March to Places on Gray-Tiered Stand; Colored Lights Flood Platform and White Backdrop.

THE children's chorus of the Inland Manufacturing company brought a close to the Girl Scout-Boy Scout drive for funds with a benefit concert presented Friday night in Memorial hall.

The concert was a striking affair. Considerable time had been spent in devising the setting; the children were tastefully gowned, and the concert presented was one invested with much charm since children's voices carry a sweet, fresh tone which is never to be dupli-

cated by the adult voice.

Girls were gowned in blue in the mid-range of the color. At their throats was white again, white accented the cuff of their brief puffed sleeves. Full skirts fell to the floor. Ribbons of like blue banded their hair. The boys were dressed in long black trousers, black coats and white shirts. Girls and boys marched in by the two opposing front doors of the auditorium; came to the small raised dias where organ and piano stood on dark carpeting; stepped up gray stairs to the platform and there mounted gray tiers. As the chorus stood in place colored lights played over the children; the green plush draperies were drawn and a white background, tinted by changing lights, was revealed.

Richard Westbrock directed the chorus and gained in several

instances some charming effects. There are those who like to see a chorus carry scores—especially such picturesque scores as those used last night. We feel, however, that any dependence on a score leads to less authoritative presentation. It detracts from spontaneity; is prone to destroy the finer rhythmic effects.


The program opened with Victor Herbert's "March of the Toys," William's "Song of the Pedler" and Hahn's "The Green Cathedral." Later McIntyre's "Starlight," Mozart's "Lullaby" and Johann Strauss's "Blue Danube," were interpreted. To both Mr. Westbrook and the Inland Manufacturing company many compliments are due. To Mr. Westrock because in one season he has built a pleasing singing group out of raw material, and to Inland Manu-facturing company, because it is sponsoring the choral group. The Boy and Girl Scouts joined in with the chorus to sing "Marching Along Together," and this they did with a genuine relish.

Mary Werner plays the piano accompaniment with Urban Deger playing organ interludes.

Little Louan Cuni danced a tap rhythm to the tune of "Marching Along Together" and received many recalls. And now comes the descriptive bit about the eye-compelling charm of the chorus. The girls were gowned in delicate blue frocks of quaint design with hair bands to match, while the boys were in Eton college suits, and the chorus made a stunning picture.

When the intermission arrived the children left the stage in double lines into the audience, and the girls handled their long frocks with ease and grace of movement, and we found ourselves loathe to let these very lucky youngsters leave the stage.
