Inland Chorus Will Present Two Concerts

The 100-voice chorus, accompanied by Isabel Herbst and Katharine Funkhouser Moore, is made up of children of employes of the Inland division of General Motors. The children range from 6 to 16 and are trained throughout the season by Westbrock.

The children will sing first Singer's arrangement of the Kol Nidre, Adler's Mi Chomocho and a work by Federlein. Their second group will include Curren's Nursery Rhymes, Williams' Song of the Pedlar and the Riff Song from Romberg's Desert Song.
