

Chamber Group To Play **Inland Children's Chorus To Present Two Concerts**

The 100-voice Inland Children's chorus, Joseph Geiger directing, will present identical concerts at 2 and 4 p.m. tomorrow for the Winter Musicales program at the Dayton Art institute.

The first half of the program includes such familiar religious music as Dieterich's "Kyrie Eleison," Stainer's "God So Loved the World," "O Quam Suavis Est" by Pietro Yon and the Welch Humn melody, "Immortal, Invisible."

Lighter selections after intermission are "Look for the Silver Lining," "The Children's Marching Song," a medley from "Sound of Music," "Cruising Down the River," "Ocarina," and "When the Saints Go Marching In."

The Winter Musicales are sponsored by the Dayton Area Chamber of Commerce with the cooperation of the Art institute.

A Cimarosa concerto played by John Wildman, oboe; William J. Foster, flute; and Eleanor McCann, piano, is scheduled on the Dayton Chamber Music society program at the Art institute 8 p.m. tomorrow.

Mildred Reiley, soprano; Gilbert Unger, clarinet; and Edythe Livingston, piano; will present the Schubert suite, "Der Hirt auf dem Felsen."

Two Brahms songs for contralto, viola and piano will feature Elizabeth Windsor, contralto; Emma Louise Odum, viola; and Alverda Fitzgerald, piano.

Walter Anderson will play Chopin's Sonata No. 2 in B-flat minor.

Inland Children Sing Today

The 100-voice Inland Children's chorus under the direction of Joseph Geiger will be presented in two identical concerts today at 2 and 4 p.m. at the Dayton Art Institute.

The programs are part of the winter series sponsored by the Dayton Area Chamber of Commerce and the Art Institute.

First half of the program by the children will be devoted to sacred music including Dieterich's Kyrie Eleison, God So Loved the World from Stainer's Crucifixion and a Welch hymn.

Secular part of the concert will include Kern's Look for the Silver Lining, excerpts from Rodgers' Sound of Music, Irving Berlin's Ocarina and the spiritual, When the Saints Go Marching In.

Paul Ray Jones is accompanist for the chorus which was organized 26 years ago as an employe relations activity of the Inland Mfg. division, General Motors.

The Miami Valley Folk Dancers will be featured next Sunday.
